Myths and Misunderstandings Derailing Nonprofit Effectiveness

The nonprofit sector is critical to the establishment, maintenance and ongoing improvement of civil society. Further, governments and communities rely greatly on the sector to deliver policy outcomes, be long-term holders of experience and skills, and to be first respondents when crises emerge. However, notwithstanding these great expectations, there exist myths and misunderstandings that work together to prevent the sustainability of the sector. They are perpetuated by the sector, by governments and by communities, often innocently but resultant from poor analysis, poor historical understandings and poor appreciation of systemic needs.

In this keynote presentation, Professor David Gilchrist will examine these issues and posit key solutions. He will frame his discussion in the context of collaboration and the important roles to be played by the sector, government and commerce.

The ethics and politics of collaboration in management research: A reflexive review

In this session, the team will explore the meaning of collaboration in management research through a reflexive review of the literature that draws attention to its ethical and political implications. They will trace the increasing pressure experienced by researchers to do collaborative research which is driven by an ideological argument that places value on knowledge being co-produced. Through reflexive analysis of their own situation in a university context where the language of collaboration is widespread, the team will draw attention to the problems associated with instrumental approaches to collaboration that tend to overlook considerations of politics and ethics and the role of reciprocity. They will argue for a more reflexive approach to research collaboration that enables actors involved to clarify how they use and understand these words and to identify differences of interest and positionality.

Collaboration with Community and Corporate Partners in Leadership

Development and Capacity Building

The collaboration between voluntary sector organisations and the corporate sector, with the aim of promoting inclusion, is a fascinating area for research and practice. These sectors often strive to improve the lives of those in the community, for example, by providing employment opportunities or by supporting those on the margins, who would otherwise be unable to harness opportunities. Dr Fidèle Mutwarasibo focuses on how effective collaboration between voluntary sector organisations, the public sector, and corporate institutions in Ireland and the UK, can help to enhance and promote inclusion.

He will discuss the lessons he has drawn from the Manchester Hub of the Black Leadership and Empowerment Programme (BLEP). BLEP is a programme Dr Fidèle Mutwarasibo leads, working in collaboration with the Prince's Trust (as a community partner), plus Autotrader and Manchester Airport Group (as corporate partners). He will share his insights into how this partnership and collaboration has enabled The Open University to run the BLEP pilot, supported leadership development of racialised minorities and enhanced the learners' capacity to become influential leaders in the community and the workplace.

Ethics and Collaboration

Collaboration is often thought as the bringing together of people and organisations to achieve a shared goal, leveraging synergies through working together and sharing resources. Despite this positive gloss, studies have shown the tensions and difficulties within collaborative practice, some of which border on the unethical. However, little attention has been paid to the kinds of ethical issues that arise when working across organisational boundaries in pursuit of a shared aim.

The team will approach the issue by thinking about ethics as a lively engagement within collaboration in respect of both what is being achieved and how it is carried out. They will surface the following issues:

- The tension between organisational and collaborative aims
- Representing and responding to the voice of all participants
- Actively engaging those affected in the domain of the collaboration
- Practices to facilitate robust, challenging and effective dialogue within collaboration

The three speakers will explore ethics and collaboration from a variety of perspectives with the aim and bringing together theory and practice.

Voluntary sector organisations' leadership practices involve balancing collaboration and competition with other organisations working in similar fields or covering the same geographical areas. Philanthropic organisations that fund

some of the work of voluntary sector organisations, on the other hand, are striking a balance between being too directive or financing duplicating activities. The increase in demand for voluntary sector services in a context where fewer resources are available, coupled with pressure on fundraising, means that collaboration within the sector is needed more than ever. In this workshop, participants will discuss how philanthropic institutions can promote collaboration while being agile enough not to stifle the voluntary sector's innovation.
