Student F looks back on studying with the Open University in Portlaoise prison during the 1990s, how the hours per week for study were underestimated and how it helped him get a job after prison.

### Transcript:

So really, I just suppose you have answered this in a way, but if you had to assess your OU experience and study in prison on your life during and since, how would you sum it up?

At different times, very, very, stressful. Very hard to actually get the bit of time. If the OU told me it was going to be eight hours a week, I automatically doubled that and added another couple of hours [laughs]. Maybe I am a wee bit slower than the average person. But when I look back on it, I look back on it with great fondness because it has enabled me to get some sort of an almost normal employment. So I put it to use, it is not just to have it on my CV which was scanty enough without it [laughs]
