## **Activity reports July 2010**

# **Method 1: Visuality Cluster**

## Overview of activities so far

• We have started a collaborative bibliography, including different books and articles on visuality understood in a broad sense. We have focused on a wide spectrum of disciplines, e.g. political science, cultural studies, art history, and psychology.

#### Activities planned

## Method 2: Mapping

#### Overview of activities so far

- Literature review and forum discussion on readings. There have been two forum topics to date.
- Members of the cluster have been working on their own research and have been evaluating how to integrate their research with mapping methodologies.
- Description of Mapping for the ICCM site.

## Activities planned until 30 September 2010

- The literature review/discussion forum posts will continue, albeit with greater frequency and intensity. The aim is to have a wide-ranging review of the ways various authors have engaged with mapping. This spans Actor-Network-Theory, contemporary French sociological theory, and critical geography.
- A discussion will occur on the maps of the US Army Human Terrain System both in Afghanistan and Iraq, thinking through how these maps can be analyzed in terms of critical security studies.
- Create a wiki document for outlining themes in the literature and key terms and concepts.
- The cluster is planning to meet for an extended period of time during the SGRI in Stockholm this coming September.
- Two of our members are included in the "What is critical about methods in Security Studies?" round table at the SGIR.

## Blogging activities

• Each member has agreed to blog on their ongoing/upcoming research activity with an eye to mapping. Topics include: mapping European security professionals, small arms control in Bosnia, and statistics/numbers as mapping or mapping as metaphor.

## Public display of material until September 2010

- Both the blog and wiki activities have the potential to turn into public documents. The literature review will become a collaborative document which will have a public facing dimension.
- A public update following the SGIR meeting, including themes and ideas generated, will be posted.
- Members will upload readings as they come up for discussion. These
  uploads will include a short description of their content in relation
  to the theme of mapping and security studies. Over time, this process
  will create a library and bibliography that others outside the project
  may find useful when first engaging with mapping.
