Resource Updates

Online Module

We wanted to highlight that following some amazing feedback from Gemma, one of our newest champions, we have updated the recently created 'Become an Open learning Champion' module. Key updates are:

- More information about the benefits of OpenLearn for learners
- More details about how accessibility works
- The exploration activity has been broken up into smaller chunks for ease
- Links to the course content have been added to the quiz questions
- Follow up after completion of the module has been made clearer

New Hub and Interactive

We are working with our colleagues in OpenLearn to develop a new hub for Scotland champions and learners. This hub will contain information and key resources to enhance the learning journey and support you in your roles. We hope to have a version we can showcase at the next coffee morning.

We are also collaborating with a colleague to develop a new interactive that will support learners to understand more about their goals, learning styles and help develop a bespoke initial learning plan for OpenLearn. This is in the early stages at the moment but we will be seeking support for testing at an appropriate stage – watch this space!

Global Accessibility Awareness Day (GAAD) 18 May 2023

With <u>GAAD</u> coming up, we thought it would be good to highlight the accessible formats that are available on the majority of OpenLearn courses. As well as increased accessibility, for example word documents for use with screen readers, once downloaded these can be used offline for learners with limited access to



IT, broadband or who prefer learning offline. (It is worth noting that there may be some interactive elements on some courses that will not be included in a printed version of an online course and for completion certificates and/or digital badges there is normally a minimum number of activities that need to be completed online.)

Examples of Alternative Formats

 Word - You can download and use the Word version of course materials with most Windows Office software and on many mobile applications. The Word format is particularly useful if you want to annotate your materials or if you use the JAWS screen reader. Word documents also provide flexibility for changing font size, colour and spacing and can be used offline and printed.

- PDF PDF downloads can be used offline across a range of devices. You will
 need an up-to-date version of Adobe Acrobat Reader in order to view them.
 PDF downloads might be useful if you want to print out some of your course
 materials to make notes on directly, you can also make notes on them
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- **Epub2** Electronic publications (EPUBs) are the most common form of ebook and will be usable with most e-readers. Downloading course materials in EPUB format to your e-reader may be helpful if you are looking for a portable way to study your materials offline or if you require your e-reader to help support your study due to a disability. In most cases you can adjust EPUB files to change the setting for font size and colour to suit your needs Kindle version is an ebook format that works on Amazon Kindle.
- **Transcripts** Videos within courses will usually also have captions and transcripts that can be downloaded for offline use.
