Two-day workshop on Sustainable Farming Practices Past and Present, Bangalore, India, 21-22 February 2018.

The AHRC-funded Changing Farmers' Lives Past and Present research project held its first event in Bangalore, co-organised by the Open University and the Karnataka based NGO Green Foundation.

A variety of presentations by academic researchers and development practitioners explored the potential, first, of Arts and Humanities approaches, in particular aspects of oral history, stories, drama, and film, to document and support small farmer creativity in developing resilience to livelihood challenges in relation to food, biodiversity, and climate issues; and second, of participatory methods aimed at local community conservation of agricultural biodiversity and revival and control of indigenous seeds. Each session was followed by lively discussions.

A very original feature of the Workshop was a visit to the Janadhanya Women's Federation in nearby Terubeedi village. At the community seed bank centre, workshop participants met with local women farmers who presented their work on seed conservation and provided delicious tasters of some of the foods produced by the group, including millet-based papadoms and savoury snacks.
