
Learning and teaching in the primary years - E103

Presentation pattern: October to June

Module description

This module is the introductory compulsory level 1 module in the BA (Hons) Education Studies (Primary) (Q94). It is for students with an interest in primary education, and in particular those aspiring to become primary school teachers, or to pursue other careers within education. Students will study a range of themes relating to primary education including: the study of children's learning; inclusive education; play and creativity; home-school liaison; and the curriculum areas of English, maths and science. They will also develop the knowledge and skills needed to work collaboratively and equitably in a range of settings, including: evaluating and communicating information effectively to others, using a range of digital technologies effectively for study, online collaboration and to support their continuing professional development, planning and managing time and tasks and working to deadlines, identifying strengths and areas for development, and seeking and learning from feedback

Person specification

As well as meeting all the requirements set out in the generic person specification, you should have:

- a degree and qualified teacher status
- experience as a primary school teacher or teacher educator
- a broad understanding of primary education, including relevant theory and research

- experience of assessing and giving effective written feedback on assignments produced by adult learners
- a willingness and ability to support students in face-to-face and online tutorials and to help develop skills for studying effectively online

It would be an advantage to have:

- Experience of working with others to deliver tuition

Additional information

As well as traditional printed study material, E103 includes a significant amount of online study, and tutors are expected to be proactive in supporting their students to become confident and effective in their engagement online. This support will include:

- starting and supporting regular online discussion threads, moderating/teaching on your students' tutor group forum
