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Motive: upper intermediate German L203

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*Presentation pattern*    *October to June*

#### *Module description*

*Motive: upper intermediate German* (previously titled L203/LZX203 *Motive: moving on in German*) is the first module in the University's Diploma in German. It extends the language skills developed in L130 *Auftakt: intermediate German* (previously titled L130/LZX130 *Auftakt: get ahead in German*) and further enhances a student's cultural knowledge. By working with interactive audio-visual, web-based and printed material from German-speaking countries, students will learn how to communicate in a wide range of situations, improve their command of grammar and vocabulary, and develop key skills (including academic skills) necessary for studying at a higher level. The integrated residential school takes place in Germany. If students are unable to attend the residential school, they must complete an online alternative learning experience. The outcome of this module is of a level comparable to B2 as defined by the Council of Europe.

You will be teaching this module by a blended tuition of synchronous conferencing, face-to-face tutorials and online forums. Some of the tutorials you hold will be online using a voice and visual conferencing system. There is also some face-to-face tuition (or alternatively telephone tuition) depending on geographical location. The module also makes use of the University's Virtual Learning Environment (VLE). The VLE will be a mixture of interactive tools and additional audio and reading material as a learning support to the printed material. You will be expected to regularly support students on the VLE via an online tutor group forum.

#### *Person specification*

The person specification for this module should be read in conjunction with the [generic person specification](#) for an associate lecturer at The Open University.

As well as meeting all the requirements set out in the generic person specification, you should have:

- Native or near-native speaker competence in German and a degree in language studies or another appropriate subject
- extensive teaching experience in German language and aspects of German studies, preferably to adults
- commitment to communicative language teaching
- sensitivity to the particular problems of teaching languages at a distance
- a broad understanding of German speaking countries, their societies and cultures
- a willingness to develop students' intercultural awareness
- the ability to use information and communication technology for language teaching

It would be an advantage to have:

- an appropriate teaching qualification
- teaching experience at tertiary level.

#### *Additional information*

- Experience of using electronic forms of distance teaching and support would be useful but training will be provided.
- Tutorials are arranged in the evenings or weekends. You are expected to be available by telephone or email between tutorials to help students with their difficulties.
- You will also moderate your own online tutor group forum; assignments will be submitted, marked and returned electronically

- You will need regular access to a computer that conforms to the specifications set out on the personal computing website for L203
