Carál Ní Chuilín reflects on the value of the skills she learned through writing her Open University assignments to life in politics

Transcript:

"So it was good. But actually going into negotiations and even going into elected politics, the good thing about education, particularly through the OU, that your political instincts are fine, that will carry you through in your personal instinct. But you do need to get, you know the old saying 'Organise, Educate, Agitate' - that has carried me through every walk of life in every part of life. Because in order to put your position forward, you need to research it; you need to have your briefing notes, you need to provide notes and explanations to different party members in order to debate them and get them through, and that is in written form so the structure of your ideas and the way you present your ideas - still to this day it's almost like writing a TMA [Tutor Marked Assignment]. You have to have a start, you have to have the middle, and you have to have a conclusion, and your conclusion - in political life - has to have a recommendation. So that still carried me through; fifty odd years of age and I'm still referring back to the structure of my TMAs, Jenny, you'll be delighted to hear that [laughs]."
