## Making online safety accessible

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Last year, we partnered with Lead Scotland to create [Everyday Computer Skills](#) – a digital skills course for absolute beginners with a focus on accessibility. This year, Lead have produced some key online safety messages in a huge range of formats and languages, including braille, large print, audio, Polish, Urdu, Chinese (with more to come). Lead Scotland are offering free 30-minute webinars on zoom this September for people wanting to get to grips with online safety and security. They are also offering 1 hour 'Training for Trainers' lunchtime sessions for practitioners, volunteers or others who support people with low digital confidence.

We also have funded health and social care courses through the National Transition Training Fund. The deadline for these is **1 September so** hurry!

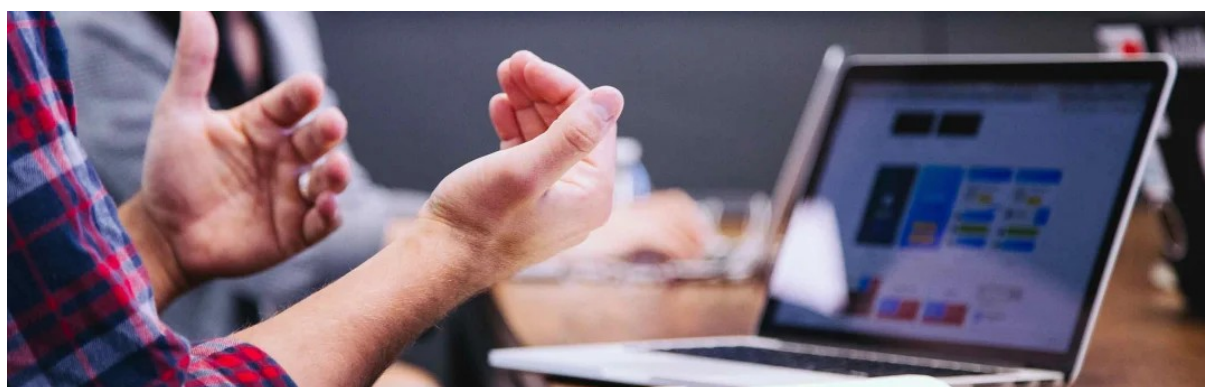

## Where to take your learning next

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If your learners (or you) have been doing OpenLearn courses during lockdown and are now thinking about their next steps these new [animations about our Access modules and Making Your Learning Count](#) might help.

[An Access module is a great place to start](#) if you want a gentle introduction to OUstudy. It can also help you to find out more about your interests and where you want your learning to take you. There are three Access modules to choose from (at SCQF level 6), and they start each February, May, and October.

[Making Your Learning Count](#) is an OU Level 1 (SCQF Level 7) module that allows you to count study from OpenLearn, or other types of previous learning, towards an OU qualification. You will reflect on what you have learned already while developing the skills you need to be a successful student.

The deadline to enroll on this module is **9 September**. Students resident in Scotland with a personal income of up to £25k may be able to study for free.

## Free Duolingo English language tests for refugees and asylum seekers

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Duolingo are offering free English language tests for students to schools, college, universities and community organisations. Duolingo provides coupon codes to organisations to give to students who need help accessing an English test in order to progress to higher education or further studies. Students can take the test online for free. Duolingo is expanding access to this initiative for organisations working to support asylum and refugee applicants. Universities, schools and community organisations supporting students seeking sanctuary can apply for the test fee waiver.
