Dear Colleagues,

I hope that many of you have enjoyed some well-deserved time off over the summer, and if you have not been able to, I hope you manage to take some time soon. As autumn arrives, we continue our countdown to COP26 which has focused our recent sustainability activities.



COP26 Green Zone event

I am delighted that our application to the cabinet office to host an event in the official COP26 Green Zone was accepted from over 4000 applications. On Sunday 7th November, the OU will host a 90-

minute collaborative event with Glasgow Life bringing art, Indigenous artists, climate science and Citizen Science together. The event is due to be held face to face and we hope there will be a livestream for those who would like to watch at home (further details will follow as they are confirmed with the organisers).

COP26 Observers

We are currently in the process of allocating our passes for official COP26 Observer status. Colleagues were invited to apply in my August bulletin. Thirty seven applications were shared blind with an external expert to collate an initial shortlist based on the 200-word summary as to why the applicant would be a good candidate. This initial shortlist contained more applicants than allocated spaces, and we are now taking into account several factors including carbon footprint of attending the event and ensuring we have a spread of expertise, perspectives and methods for disseminating learning. We'll be in touch with applicants this month and update you on our final selection next bulletin.
