Tree Planting

Since October 2020, The Open University Graduate School have planted a tree for each graduating PhD and Professional Doctorate student at either Forest of Marston Vale (a Community Forest located close to the University campus in Buckinghamshire) or Neno Macadamia Trust in Malawi where the trees will support farmers and their families. The tree planting project is a way of us congratulating and marking each student's admirable success in completing their doctorate whilst demonstrating our commitment to climate action.

I wanted to share with you all a recent photo (below) of the new Queens Wood (Marston Vale) that the OU helped plant last year. It's fantastic to see so many saplings that will be maintained and grow into a new forest. Unfortunately, many tree planting initiatives do not succeed as they are planted but not maintained, meaning they don't succeed to fruition. However, we will be monitoring above-ground growth and changes in the soil, to give a full picture of how the trees are performing. Staff from OUiS took part in a tree planting day at the end of January where they worked together to plant UK native heritage fruit trees. The new orchard, at Corstorphine Hill Local Nature Reserve, forms part of Edinburgh's 'Million Trees' project. Hedgehog Friendly Campus

Continuing the outdoors theme, on 2 February, Sarah Cooling, Business Analyst, Academic Services, shared the news that The Open University has achieved the Hedgehog Friendly Campus Bronze Award for 2022-2023.

The Hedgehog Friendly Campus team worked hard last year to complete 11 of the 10 required activities to achieve the OU's first award. Their activities included creating a working group, surveying existing hedgehog numbers, litter picking events, participation in Hedgehog Awareness Week, and working closely with the Grounds Team to improve safety with the gardening equipment, and building and positioning hedgehog nest boxes (x5) and giant insect hotels (x2) around the Walton Hall campus. International Book Giving Day

child's mental health, and by the age of 11 there is a 12-month language development gap between children from homes with plenty of books and those with very few. The Children's Book Project is a charity who collect pre-loved children's books and redistribute them to children who need them.

Go Green have placed a box in the Go Green Centre (Walton Hall campus) where you can donate children's books for the charity until Tuesday 28 February. Tom from the OU Students Association will then take these to the nearest drop-off points for the charity to collect.
