# A MESSAGE FROM NICK BRAITHWAITE



Dear Colleagues,

Monday 20th March marks the 'equinox', with our northern hemisphere days now longer than nights until late September. It's also the 'equinox' in the southern hemisphere but with days now shortening and nights lengthening. This globally significant



time is chosen by the <u>Earth Hour</u> initiative to call for an hour of active reflection: at 8.30 pm local time on Saturday 26th March, Earth Hour calls for 60 minutes of widespread, large-scale 'lights out'. It's a time for our local natural world to prevail, so do make plans to disconnect from the energy network and perhaps just be in nature. I filmed <u>this</u> one <u>minute clip</u> for social media about what happens when you ask nothing more from the Earth than an hour of oxygen while being at rest.

## Wild Isles

Talking of the natural world on our doorsteps, on Sunday 12th March, the new and highly anticipated OU/BBC natural history co-production *Wild Isles* reached our television screens after three years in the making. The series, which focuses on the beauty and fascinating diversity of the British and Irish countryside was informed by the expertise of OU academics Dr Philip Wheeler and Dr Miranda Dyson.

To celebrate the release, the OU is inviting everyone to share their favourite British and Irish nature spots or species on social media, using the hashtag #ShareYourWildIsles. Continuing the theme of events, Go Green's February workshop welcomed back Jen Gale from Sustainable(ish). Jen discussed the Sustainable(ish) ideas around progress

Jodi will have some Go Green litter pickers, gloves, and bags available – you can sign up to join her here (those signed up will receive a calendar reminder). If you are in a Nation office or other OU location, Jodi is keen to get in touch with folks who can set up other lunchtime litter picks for colleagues. This is a fantastic initiative to get outside for some gentle exercise whilst doing something to help sustain our natural environment.

On Thursday 6th April at 12.00-12.30pm, Go Green will continue the theme of biodiversity as they return to online workshop sessions. Joined by the Parks Trust, Jodi and colleagues will be discussing the protection of Great Crested Newts and how they are important for biodiversity. You can sign up via Eventbrite to attend.

## **Travel Advice**

Hybrid working leads to reduced levels of fossil fuel use in commuting to the benefit of our Scope 3 emissions (Greenhouse Gas Protocol). Car sharing and the use of public transport can make further reductions. For people traveling to our Walton Hall campus, the Travel Advice team would like to make colleagues aware of the <u>car share scheme</u> and the recently negotiated new bus service (the 9/9a). This service runs twice a day (08:45 arrival and a 17:13 departure), you can find the full route and timetable <u>via the travel advice page</u>.

Travel Advice has also announced that electric vehicle (EV) charging posts have been installed at the Cardiff and Nottingham offices. So, if you have an EV and wish to use these posts, including the Walton Hall and Wellingborough posts, please join the EV Charging Scheme. # **Fossil Fuel Divestment**

In October 2021, in the run up to COP26, we responded to calls to divest our holdings in fossil fuel extraction companies as part of our net zero plan. Yvonne Chakraborty, OU Student and member of People and Planet OU, was part of the campaign and

welcomed the announcement, tweeting "Fantastic news @OpenUniversity and @TimJBlackman what a good day for the OU!!!". At this time, holdings in fossil fuels businesses amounted to around 1.5% and we committed to full divestment from this sector by 2023.

Paul Traynor, Chief Finance Officer, has provided the following update on progress to divestment. "Following Council's decision last year to ensure our long-term investment funds do not contain exposure to fossil fuel companies, the Investment Committee has been working to ensure that we achieve this aim by the December 2023. It is not a simple transaction as there are costs involved and the choice of ethical funds is relatively limited currently. However, good progress is being made and the deadline will be met."

Our commitment to sustainability stretches far and wide across the University, and social and environmental justice form a golden thread that runs through all that we do in the OU as a business and the OU as an educator.
