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Four ministers dismissed

Four ministers were dismissed late last night by President Filipe Nyusi. They are Foreign Minister Oldemiro Balói, Agriculture and Food Security Minister José Pacheco, Industry and Commerce Minister Ernesto Max Tonela, and Minerals and Energy Minister Letícia Klemens. No replacements have been named, and, as usual, no reasons given.

Pacheco was seen as close to former President Amando Guebuza. He had been agriculture minister since 2010, and previously served as interior minister 2005-09. Until the Frelimo Congress in September he had been on the Frelimo Political Commission and had been head of the Verification Commission, the Frelimo disciplinary body. In 2014 he was head of the government delegation in negotiations with Renamo. When Nyusi appointed his government in 2015, he kept Pacheco in post but moved rural development out of the agriculture ministry into a new ministry of development and environment under Celso Correia. Pacheco has been accused of being involved in the illegal timber trade, and last year Correia, clearly acting with agreement of Nyusi, launched a crackdown on the illegal timber trade, suggesting Pacheco's power was waning.

Minerals and Energy is a key post because gas and mining are the key economic areas, and businesswoman Klemens was only appointed a year ago, in October 2016, to replace Pedro Couto. Her appointment had been controversial because she had no prior government experience. *Africa Energy Intelligence* (18 Oct 2016) said Couto was "very cautious and reputedly incorruptible," but was sacked when the gas companies put pressure on the government because they felt Couto was pushing too hard in Mozambique's interests.

Balói had been foreign minister since 2008 (named by Armando Guebuza) and had held various ministerial posts in the 1990s under President Joaquim Chissano.

Tonela is an economist appointed as minister by Nyusi. Before that he was the Administrator of Hidroeléctrica de Cahora Bassa (HCB) and before that had been finance director of Electricidade de Moçambique (EdM) in an era when it was well run.

Comment: Fertilizer - a missed opportunity

An opportunity to create a domestic fertilizer industry to promote agriculture has been lost because Mozambique does not have a coordinated development strategy. Mozambique's agricultural production is so low because farmers use so little fertilizer because it is too expensive. Two of the three main ingredients of fertilizer exist in Mozambique, but there is no policy to put them together.

Fertilizer provides three main nutrients – nitrogen (N), phosphorus (P), and Potassium (K). Nitrogen increases yield and. P and K improve crop quality. Mozambique has phosphate rock which can be used to produce P and natural gas to produce N. Last week it was admitted that no company was willing to develop the phosphate rock in Monapo, Nampula. (*Noticias*, Zitamar 7 Dec). Earlier this year, Yara won the contract to produce nitrogen fertiliser from natural gas in Cabo Delgado, mostly for export. Even though it was discussed two years ago (<http://bit.ly/MozGasEn>), no one thought to put farmers, N and P together in one package.

Yara is one of the largest fertilizer companies in the world and said informally that, if asked, it would have been willing to create a domestic fertilizer production and distribution company. In its tender for domestic gas use, the government could - and should - have given priority to a fertilizer company that would use local phosphate and would distribute fertilizer at local level at a reduced price. Yara is not a charity, and would have demanded to pay a bit less for the gas - a small price to create a domestic fertilizer industry and promotion of Mozambican farmers.

A lack of joined up thinking means Mozambique lost a chance to create a domestic industry and support farmers. *jh*

Comment and correction: Electricity

The ownership of the Cahora Bassa dam company (Hidroelectrica de Cahora Bassa, HCB) was incorrectly given in the previous newsletter. HCB is owned 92.5% by the government of Mozambique, and not by the state electricity company Electricidade de Moçambique (EDM).

But this provides an opportunity to point to the way the government of President Filipe Nyusi has been trying to make electricity a well run state sector. There were two key changes a year ago. Pedro Couto was sacked as minerals minister and appointed chair of HCB in September 2016. He has a reputation for integrity and hard bargaining, and both changes were because of that. The gas companies demanded he go because of his staunch defence of Mozambican interests in the gas sector. But Mozambique had just paid off its debt on Cahora Bassa and the government was actually taking control - and Nyusi used his power to appoint a serious head and not a political hack.

Technical staff at HCB are now largely Mozambican. *Engineering News* (13 Nov) said Couto "has been mandated to strengthen HCB as a commercially viable power producer and to seek and participate in profitable energy projects." Such projects cannot be funded out of revenue, and HCB will have to look for commercial finance; HCB is looking to projects such as the Mpandha Nkuwa dam 60 km downstream from Cahora Bassa and the new power line to Maputo.

EDM is also being transformed, and in October 2016 it became the first state company to hire its

four top administrators through an international public competition. Now it is trying to catch up on maintenance and repairs which were not possible in the Guebuza era.
