
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Police attack Azagaia's funeral cortege & marches to pay homage to the rapper

Police attacked young people across the country as they marked the death of popular rapper Azagaia. His funeral at the Maputo city hall conducted by Emeritus Anglican Bishop Dinis Sengulane took place without incident on Tuesday morning (14 July) but several thousand young people gathered at Praça de Independência in front of the city hall to join the funeral cortege to Michafutene cemetery in Marracuene. Police, including armoured cars and a heavily armed contingent of riot police, fired teargas to try to disperse the growing crowd and beat and arrested some young people, and forced a change of route. But the growing crowd followed the casket to the cemetery.

Azagaia criticised elites of all parties and became the voice of youth. Peaceful marches to pay homage to the popular rapper where scheduled for Saturday (18 March) in cities across the country. In Maputo the March was officially approved by mayor Eneas Comiche but was violently attacked by the police with dogs, teargas and rubber bullets. Teargas was used in streets surrounding the Eduardo Mondlane statue where the march was to start, to stop young people from arriving. Young people were arrested and beaten; in Maputo there were 22 arrested and 19 people admitted to the central hospital, including one man who lost an eye when he was hit by a rubber bullet fired at close range.

On 17 March, the day before the homage marches, the US embassy issue a "March 18, 2023 Security Alert: Avoid Large Gatherings in Maputo". Did the embassy know or suspect what the police were planning?

An attempt to have a protest march in front of the Ministry of Interior in Maputo today (20 March), was repelled by tear gas, <u>as shown in this video.</u>

In several cities the Saturday marches banned; in Vilankulo the mayor said in writing he was <u>banning the march on orders</u> "from above" (*orientação superior*). (CDD 19 Mar, also good pictures of police actions.) Marches were attacked by police in Beira where 12 people were arrested including the municipal assembly speaker Ricardo Lang, Nampula where a march organiser Gamito dos Santos Carlos was arrested and had not been released after 24 hours, Xai Xai and elsewhere.

Only in Quelimane were there were no clashes. Mayor Manuel de Araujo, led the march and a contingent of the municipal police was present, but it did its normal job of escorting and protecting

the marchers. State news agency AIM (20 March) noted that "the peaceful nature of the event showed that the young fans of Azagaia do not want to start riots, but merely to honour the man they regard as their hero." (Perhaps the police in Quelimane were more nervous because they had shot and killed a local musician, Ed Azevedo, during a parade celebrating Araujo's re-election as mayor on November 2013. An attack on the march would have stirred bad memories and resentment.)

Several publications noted that for some years the police have enforced a general, and totally unconstitutional, ban on all marches that are not in support of Frelimo.

The police attacks were widely reported by global media and harshly criticized by international and local organisations. "The violent repression, of nationwide peaceful protests to remember the fallen musician Azagaia, by the Mozambican police, including beating up of protesters, teargassing and targeting organizers for their role in organizing the rallies ... is a violation of the right of freedom of assembly [and shows] a disturbing pattern of reckless and unlawful tactics against people during protests" said Amnesty International.

The Mozambican Bar Association (Ordem dos Advogados) "expresses its indignation at the denial of the right to demonstrate by the Mozambican police" when the marches were peaceful and represented no public threat. "The right to freedom of assembly is one of the pillars of democracy and must be respected by the authorities." Bar association spokesperson Victor da Fonsecae called for a halt of what he called a trend of wanting to normalise a dictatorship, where there is no space for public demonstrations.

Azagaia had suffered from epilepsy and died at age 38 on 9 March. His family issued a brief statement confirming that he had an epileptic seizure and was alone in his room, so there was nobody to rescue him when he collapsed.
